Thanksgiving, prior to this year, has always included gathering for worship at church and then gathering with family and friends to feast. A traditional hymn that I have long associated with Thanksgiving opens with the words, "We gather together to ask the Lord's blessing..." Since it is commonly sung at Thanksgiving I assumed it had some connection to the Pilgrim's sense of religious freedom in America; but I was wrong. It turns out that the song, using an old Dutch folk tune, was most likely written by Dutch Protestants following the military defeat of the Spanish cavalry in the Battle of Turnhout in 1597. It has nothing to do with Pilgrims or our nation's Thanksgiving. The Spanish Catholics had denied the Dutch Protestants gathering for worship, and this song relished the relief of "the wicked oppressing, now cease from distressing."

Nonetheless, I still like the song, and I am, as always, thankful for our nation and our religious freedoms. This year, however, we sacrifice our worship and family gatherings out of a shared commitment to love one another and our community. These are noble sacrifices, and I remember the reassuring last line of that song: "Sing praises to his name, he forgets not his own." --Pastor Doug MacLeod
