We live in lamentable days. Tragically, 380,000 fellow US citizens have been slain by COVID-19. The gospel is being compromised by the heresy of nationalism. Precious Christian symbols, and even the name of Jesus, are being abused by insurrectionists. While we lament such realities, we do not despair. While princes rage, the church persists because the Lamb is on the throne.

The New Testament book of Revelation is a wonderful gift to the church of all ages which lives in and struggles to be faithful amid the profound challenges of secularism and the turmoil of the world. Thus, I am planning on opening this marvelous book with you in the coming weeks in our worship services. It is a book of exceeding comfort, instruction, and perspective for the church and her witness. Read the first chapter several times in the coming weeks as we'll be reading it in worship beginning on January 24. Then, before and during Lent, we'll visit the seven churches addressed in chapters 2 and 3.

From Your Student Ministries Director's Desk

It's been a week since we celebrated epiphany, and in that week, we've seen a lot of human brokenness. No matter what side of the aisle you sit on, I think it is safe to say that there have been way too many examples of people going to war with each other between the events of Wednesday afternoon and the last four years. I find it personally heartbreaking how large our human capacity for hatred is. Thursday afternoon, I open my FYSH semester lesson plans, and realized this past Sunday we were slated to talk about peace. I couldn't believe my eyes. How do you talk about peace in a week where there is so much division and hatred?

We started in Ephesians, and we discussed how peace is found in Christ who tears down "walls of hostility." Then in Romans, we learned that it is our responsibility to choose to live at peace with those around us because we need to love others. Finally, in John, we are reminded that peace is not just a box to check but is, in fact, a gift from Jesus. So you might be thinking to yourself, "Ok....." I told my students that the point of this is that if we call ourselves peacemakers, then we need to intentionally deny ourselves and live more like Jesus. So that means, while the world may be embroiled in hatred, we choose to love, whether we agree 100% with the other person or not. This might seem difficult, but with Jesus and his ragtag band of C students, tax collectors, and sinners as our example I know it is doable.

This data dates from our church's beginnings in 1914 into the first year of World War II, and covers the 1,090 individuals who were 2nd CRC members over that time period.
