Despite appearances, I grew up familiar, albeit not necessarily super excited, with the work it takes to keep the family farm going. My grandparents lived on a farm, my dad sold farm equipment and for a time co-owned a dealership, and it was a regular occurrence to get brought out to the farm to help with some kind of project. (Sometime, ask me how pulling fences posts turned into me working at a pizza place for the next four years.) The farm task I found the most interesting was getting an ear of corn and checking it out to estimate how good the yield would be. A few weeks ago, I watched my 63-year-old dad and my 86-year-old grandpa debate how good the yield would be. They disagreed. It is good to know that some things never change.

I love the simplicity of lowa summers on the farm and how simple things can seem. Wake up, check the corn, pray it keeps growing, fix something that's broken, go to bed, repeat. (Dad, when you read this, I know there is a lot more to it than that.) There is a rhythm to farm life that centers around praying, doing what you can, and hoping for the best. I often think, at least for me, that our rhythms look a little bit more like: accomplish everything, climb the ladder, hurry to the next thing. I think there is a kind of faithfulness to farmers and farm life that I find impressive. Their livelihoods are based on this going well, yet they know that there is only so much they can do to help their corn grow. I wonder what our lives would look like if we spent a little less time striving and a little more time hoping in the promise that God is working "all things God works for the good of those who love him." My Dad and Grandpa's faithfulness is something that I admire, and I strive to live my life a little more like them. Doing what I can to make my corner of the world a better place, praying, and believing that God will take care of the rest. Friends of Jesus Christ, I invite you, in this season of transition, to join me in this work of learning to trust the Lord more and more each day. I don't believe we will be disappointed.
