"Be present in the midst of this far-reaching pain, O Lord, for we are reeling again, at news of another loss of life that touches us all; news of flourishing diminished; of individuals harmed; of pain imposed, not only upon victims and their families who bear now the immediate brunt of it – but also upon our nation. For we are connected as a people, and this hurt, this grief, touches us all.

Engage our imaginations and move our hearts to compassion, O Lord, that we would interact with these casualties, not as news stories or statistics, but as our own sisters and brothers, flesh and blood, diving image-bearers, irreplaceable individuals whose losses will leave gaping holes in homes, friendships, workplaces, churches, schools, organizations, and neighborhoods. ...

From the chaos of this tragedy call forth new life and order and flourishing. Take even what our adversary might have meant for evil, and from it bring forth eternal good. You alone have the strength to carry this people... You alone have compassion enough to enter our widespread grief, and turn it to hope... Amen."

Update from Karin Medical Clinic

Dear friends and supporters of the Karin Medical Clinics,

Joan and I wish to express our appreciation to all of you during this season of Thanksgiving. This year we have so much to be thankful for despite the ongoing Covid 19 pandemic. Covid has hit northern Uganda particularly hard, with many serious illnesses and deaths among the population. Villagers had no personal protective equipment initially and (still) virtually no access to vaccines. Yet God has spared Hope (she did battle through a very bad case of Covid) and her staff and allowed them to continue their ministry among some of the poorest people in East-Central Africa.

Additionally, projects such as two new wells (the Unyama clinic and the Agape Christian School), the completion of the new laboratory at the Unyama Clinic, and partnership with AquaClara to provide large water filtration stations/systems at all three wellheads have been completed. These stations will provide clean, pure water sources for many surrounding villages at each of these locations. God has blessed richly even during this difficult time. Thanks to an NGO from Belgium, a new maternity center has been constructed at the Agonga Clinic. Maternity centers are now open at both clinics! Thank you very much for partnering with us in this work of Christian mercy and compassion.
